

Travel. The Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA) has provided an update regarding the NEXUS and Fast programs. Currently, all enrolment centers and temporarily closed, and all interviews previously scheduled will be postponed. Applicants and existing members will be required to reschedule their interviews upon the USA and Canada resuming joint enrollment operations. Updates are available on the CBSA website. Those who have submitted a renewal application prior to their cards' expiry date will have their membership maintained for 18 months beyond the expiry date. This time frame likely reflects two factors; the possible belief that the border will be closed to non-essential travel for a lengthy period, while the program will likely have long wait times as people's memberships are expiring during the down period. Once restrictions are eased, interviews will not take place in the Vancouver Urban Enrollment Centre and instead will likely take place nearby the Vancouver International Airport or in Birch Bay, Washington.

Exempt travelers, who do not require a period of self-isolation, include those that trade or transport services; essential services; cross-border services or medical services. Those who have previously entered Canada on exempt travel but are now trying to cross for a non-essential reason will be denied entry. All travelers, including those who are exempt from self-isolation, must provide information to CBSA upon entry. To speed the process, the ArriveCAN mobile app allows a traveler to submit their application up to 48 hours prior to their arrival to the border. Those who are travelling for none-exempt travel

**Economic Impact.** The world economy has taken a large hit, with many countries seeing a substantial decline of their GDP and a slowing to their economies due to COVID-19. According to the Organisation for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD)<sup>1</sup>, the country which has seen the most severe impact to its economy in the second quarter of 2020, had it reduced by 30.2% since the same period last year. Followed by Spain (-22.1%), the UK (21.7%), Tunisia (21.6%) and France (19%). Taiwan and South Korea have seen fewer negative effects to the economy post COVID-19, contracting by only 0.6% and 3%, respectively. Canada experienced a reduction of 13.5%, while the USA decreased by 9.5%. The USA and the UK almost both account for almost 28% of the world's economy, with experts predicting the world's GDP will decrease by almost 5% this year.








According to the Canadian Real Estate Association, the average price of a house in Canada has increased by 18% since the previous year, with sales skyrocketing. In comparison to August 2019, this year a third more houses were sold in August, and an increase of 6% more than in July of this year. Although it is likely that the increase is due to many holding off on buying homes during COVID-19 restrictions, much of which have now been lifted. It is unclear whether this increase in sales and prices will continue into the future, and how the effects of COVID-19 impact the housing market. On the other hand, reports suggest that the Vancouver and Toronto rental market has seen a decrease of about 10% to 14% in monthly rental prices, with Vancouver rents falling almost 3% in one month for a one-bedroom apartment. Similarly, rents are reducing in other cities including Barrie and London, ON. Meanwhile, rents in Abbotsford, BC and Halifax, NS, are increasing by about 5%, suggesting individuals may be moving to more rural areas for reasons that could be related to either remote work or are pushed to smaller towns with cheaper accommodations, due to personal financial factors.

Will individuals move away from densified areas and cities due to the ability to work from home? Will there be a rush of early retirees who would be interested in downsizing or moving elsewhere to more rural areas? Will individuals who have been financially affected by the measures be able to afford a home or did the COVID-19 measures allow Canadians to be able to save more and spend less? Would world climate and instability in some areas cause more immigration to Canada, or will immigration reduce due to the global pandemic? These questions indicate factors which will influence the Canadian housing market.





Domestic Crime. Vancouver Police Department has released their crime statistics, suggesting there was an increase in a 5% in violent crime in the first half of the year. Specifically, neighbourhoods such as Strathcona, Yaletown and downtown Vancouver have seen the highest increases. Strathcona, where a homeless camp is now situated, has seen calls for weapons up by 50% and break ins increasing by 68% in comparison to last year. The increase in violent crime was due to serious assaults, but due to many businesses being close, break ins to commercial areas and businesses have increased by almost 50%. Anecdotal evidence suggests that those participating in crime have applied for the CERB, as many do not care about following rules, and that homeless encampments are seeing more and more individuals from other areas in Canada, who have heard that Vancouver is a haven for drugs and where little enforcement takes place. A disrupted drug supply triggering an increase in prices may have also contributed, resulting in an uptick in crime.


