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
2. INSIGHT and SITUATIONAL AWARENESS

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Analysis of Canadian COVID-19 Cases. An analysis was conducted of all confirmed cases in Canada starting at the beginning of the pandemic to the first week of September, which amounted to 121,795 cases. At the beginning, as long-term care homes saw a large number of cases, the largest group being diagnosed with the virus was those over the age of 80. However, starting in Mid-August, cases in individuals under 30 began to increase which resulted in the largest group to become infected with COVID-19.

Different age groups on average appear to have differing symptoms. This data is incomplete as not all provinces report on the symptoms. For those that do, it was found that cough and "other" symptoms (including loss of taste and smell) appear to be the most common symptoms. Not long after comes a runny nose, headache and sore throat. Of interest, those under 19 appear to mostly have cough and other symptoms like the runny nose and sore throat. BC has recently removed runny nose and sore throat from the school list of symptoms requiring children to stay home, and Ontario is also looking to remove some symptoms which could equate to COVID-19 cases being missed, unless additional symptoms contained on the list, are also experienced.

The following is a graphic referencing symptom frequency by age for cases in Canada.




Almost 10% of individuals who test positive for the virus will be hospitalized. This number may be incorrect as it may skew more towards the older individuals who were hit hardest at the beginning of the pandemic. 2% of all cases needed ICU hospitalization, but mostly those over 50 years of age required hospitalizations. The most common symptom for those hospitalized was shortness of breath and fever, which was also common in those cases which proved to be fatal.





The number of deaths varies significantly by age group. In Canada, two people have died who were under 19, and for those aged 20 to 29, 9 individuals have died. 15 individuals aged 30 to 39 had fatal outcomes, and 51 positive cases from 40 to 49 have died from the virus. The numbers increase for those aged 50 and more. The



largest number of deaths, about 6,500, are attributed to those over 80. On average, recovery last between just under two weeks for those under 19, to just under three weeks for those over 80, with the rest falling somewhere between two to three weeks. For those hospitalized, an average stay was almost three weeks, while those in the ICU had averaged five weeks of recovery.


Economic Impact. According to the International Labour Organization (ILO), the average income earned from employment in the world has dropped by about 10.7%, equivalent to a total of \$3.5 trillion. Although this does not take into consideration the government supports provided to individuals during the pandemic. The numbers are high due to the economic impact for women, many of whom have stayed home with their children, unable to work. Some companies are continuing to close doors and rolling business closures in some areas are affecting the ability for individuals to maintain continuous employment. In the second quarter of 2020, almost 500 million jobs were lost, accounting for 17.3% of global working time. Furthermore, the prediction for the fourth quarter of 2020 has been revised to amount to 8.6% less than in the same quarter of 2019.


COVID-19 mutations. A study recently released, which has been released in pre-print and thus its finding should be taken lightly until it is peer-reviewed, reveals that the large numbers positive cases in the United States may have fuelled the virus to mutate. As more individuals are infected and transmit the virus, the more opportunities it allows for the virus to mutate. One mutation is believed to make the virus more contagious, however, non of the mutations found have made it more fatal. A small mutation in the spike protein, which allows the virus to latch onto human cells, may have enhanced the virus' ability to attach to the cells. Although this has not been found to affect clinical outcomes, it does present difficulties for controlling the virus' spread. This may also affect how a vaccine is developed, and should the virus continue to mutate, a COVID-19 vaccine may need to be altered occasionally, like how the flu vaccine changes on a frequent basis.








3.1. CANADA NEWS

A news outlet obtained a leaked copy of Ontario's draft pandemic preparedness plan for the fall, which contains targeted restrictions which appear to avoid imposing a full lockdown again. The document has three possible scenarios, depending on the size of the second wave - small, moderate, or large. The draft document is incomplete and may still be amended but will be fully released once completed. Ontario and other large provinces are seeing an increase in COVID-19 cases, with numbers at their highest since June. Should numbers continue to increase, it is likely that restrictions aimed at individual workplaces or organizations will require closures for a given period. It is also likely that specific high-risk industries will be targeted, much like what has recently occurred in BC with the closing of banquet halls and nightclubs. Ontario will utilize private medical clinics to assist in clearing the surgery backlog which was caused by the cancellation of elective surgeries. Additionally, as more people return to some normal activities, overcrowding in hospitals is beginning to occur along with a shortage of health care workers. This will likely put a strain on the medical system as the fall continues, likley signaling a difficult period ahead for Ontario.


